Missionaries are assigned to districts and, then on the district level, connected to local churches. This gives each church an opportunity to become personally acquainted with the missionary family and their field of service. Typically, churches send cards, cash gifts, packages, and other remembrances to their LINKS missionaries. In return, the churches feel a sense of involvement with the global mission enterprise of the church through regular correspondence from the missionaries, updates from their field, and even through deputation services while the missionaries are on home assignment. We are planning a **District Work & Witness Trip to the Philippines.** The Team Leader is Rev. Ivan Jess. He can be contacted through the Arcola First Church at 217-268-3114 or e-mail <u>revj1@juno.com</u>. The project is going to be at APNTS.

I was recently in a meeting with Missionary Greg Taylor who shared a little history and update of the APNTS project that will be our regional W&W project. Manila is a city of fifteen million people. There are thirty-five Nazarene churches in metro Manila. Asia Pacific Nazarene Theological Seminary is a mission training school and a center of ministry throughout Asia. It is a hub for regional activities. English is the language spoken at the seminary. Initial funding was used to build the Nielson building, a four-story structure. Various W&W teams have committed to finish the floors.

- Basement—Communication system (completed)
- First floor—administrative offices (completed)
- Second floor—Cobb Worship Center and a multi-purpose floor. This is to be funded and completed by 2013 by the Central USA Region.
- Third floor—Library & research center (completed)
- Fourth floor—Fairbanks International Communication and Donald Owens School of World Mission (funded by Korea District) is to be completed and dedicated, November 2010.

We are going to be working on the Second floor as part of the Central USA Region.

*Our regional project is in honor of Dr. Brent and Marty Cobb and in memory of their young son, Stephen, who was tragically electrocuted while they were missionaries in Korea. Dr. Cobb later served as Regional Director of the Asia-Pacific Region. The Northeastern Indiana District will send the first team in January, followed by Southwest Indiana in February. Our W & W teams will be working alongside the locals.

The work will be inside. The second floor is a huge open space with a concrete floor and walls with metal studs.

This will be a great trip. The Team will be staying and eating on campus near the project work area.

Team size is limited so let Pastor Ivan know if you want to go. The dates have not yet been locked in. More information will be given at the combined NMI, NYI and SDMI Convention on July 13, 2010. See you there! -- Bill Brandon


WELCOME NEW ARRIVALS

Kingdom Mathematics

We know about math, in fact math has a lot to do with how we look at and measure the mission of our churches and our district. There are four basic functions of mathematics: addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. Let's all agree that we don't like subtraction, the "take away" function. Though we face it's reality in many of our declining churches, we despise it, and wish to escape the empty horizontal dash that precedes any negative sum. Whether it's attendance figures or funds raised, we don't want to subtract anything.

We also don't like division. This is the figure associated with "church splits," when "one becomes two" by separation. While some churches have been born out of such "messed up" mathematics, we do not want to go there.

What the church most often aims for is addition. "How many more this week than last week?" or "How much increase this year?" Addition means growth, and we like that. Healthy churches, like healthy bodies, grow. Not in inches and pounds, but in members and dollars, and usually square feet of space. We like adding, and we should always rejoice when addition is happening in our congregations and on our District. We long to have more folks worshiping among us, and more churches in Illinois.

But, to steal a phrase, may I show you a "more excellent way." Multiplication is the function of divine choice, and the mathematics of the kingdom. Wasn't the first commandment given to humanity to "go forth and multiply?" Multiplication is how our families grow. And though we rejoice at the healthy growth of our children, we all understand that at some age they will stop growing, and start multiplying. We want healthy, strong growing children, but what we really want is grandchildren. So, while it is true that "healthy churches grow," it is likewise true that mature churches, like mature adults, "reproduce."

What does this look like for a church or as a district strategy? It means that the principle of "reproduction by multiplication" becomes a core value in all of our churches. In fact, we should take it one step further. Going back to our bodies as examples again, our growth, while it is measured by addition, is produced by multiplication. And that is because the most basic elements of our bodies, our cells, multiply regularly. Multiplication is addition on steroids.

We've all heard illustrations like this:

You are offered a job, which lasts for 4 weeks. You get to choose your salary.

- Either, you get \$100 for the first day, \$200 for the second day, \$300 for the third day. Each day you are paid \$100 more than the day before.
- **Or**, you get 1 cent for the first day, 2 cents for the second day, 4 cents for the third day. Each day you are paid double what you were paid the day before.

Which do you choose?

If you choose addition (and who wouldn't want to have \$100 more pay each day?) here's what you'll have:

- At the end of week 1: \$2,800; week 2: \$7,700; week 3: \$12,600; and at the end of week 4: \$17,500, for a grand total of \$40,600. Not bad for a month's work.
- But consider the results of multiplication:
- Choose multiplication and at the end of the first week you'll pocket \$1.27; then week 2: \$162.56; week 3: \$20,807.68; and at the end of week 4 you get the astounding payday of \$2,663,383.04! All for a grand total of \$2,684,354.55!

Now, there are two important facts about multiplication that we must see as we pursue our mission. 1) Multiplication grows much slower than addition – at first. Imagine two participants in the above experiment, one choosing addition, the other multiplication meeting to compare their earnings at the end of the first week, or even the second. Multiplication starts very slowly. 2) We must start with "the one." If addition is what we want, then we're not so concerned about the quality of "the one" who gets added. We're just as happy to "add" Christians from other churches so that the final total is more than what we had before. But, if we are going to multiply, we have to find those who have first "become disciples who will make disciples." We can add church attendees, but what we will get is church attendees. Multiplication resists the seduction of addition and reaches "the one" who will most likely multiply. Who is that? The answer is lost people who have been found by Jesus.

Both of these principles are illustrated in the ministry of Tim Young, Jr., a former math teacher, and our new church planter at Granite City. Tim, with his wife Andrea, is planting the church in their community by living missionally and seeking simply to make disciples. Tim, as we heard at our recent District Team Days, is a dynamic preacher and communicator. No doubt, he could rent a building and in a short time, he would gather a congregation of 30 or so who would come to worship and hear him preach. We would rejoice that a new congregation has been added to our District, and the worship attendance would read +30. But who would they most likely be? Disciples who multiply, or Christians who are looking for a new church to attend?

Instead, what Tim and Andrea have done is this. They have begun to invest time into their community in places like the local skate park, where they eventually met Anna. Tim and Andrea began discipling Anna and nurturing her hunger to know Christ through Bible Study, and personal friendship. This went on for several weeks, until last Thursday night, when Anna became a disciple of Jesus. She was baptized this week and has already begun talking to her friends about Jesus, the Christ whom she is now following. Anna is "the one" with whom multiplication can begin.

Jesus, our all wise shepherd, knew this math as well. He understood that in his kingdom it makes sense to leave a flock of 99 sheep in order to find "the one" lost one. He talked about planting seeds and how one seed, in good soil can produce 30, 60, even 100 "times" what was planted. This is why Jesus spent the majority of his time with only twelve disciples in the hopes of one day reconciling the whole world to God.

And it's why his last commandment to them was to "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them ..., and teaching them to obey all things that I have commanded you." And it's also why the principle of multiplication has to start not just with pastors and churches, but with each disciple of Jesus. Multiplication is essential to the fulfilling the mission of our district, "to produce healthy, multiplying, holiness churches". Go forth and multiply... Mark Copley
